



# BOTTOM-UP Crochet Hats

In this book you will find 9 pretty and trendy crochet hats that are worked from the bottom up. The ribbed bottom on each hat is very stretchy and comfortable! I suggest using wool or acrylic blends, as they have bounce and stretch to them. At the beginning of each pattern will be a list of suggested tools. Please note that these are suggestions! The hook size you will need will be decided by [your gauge swatch](#), so please take the time to make one. I have also linked to yarns and other tools using affiliate links, which means I make a small commission should you click through and make a purchase (at no extra cost to you!). I hope you enjoy making the cozy items in this book!

## STRIPED SLOUCHY HAT

### What you need:

- Medium Weight Yarn (Knit Picks Brava – [Mint, Dove Heather](#))
- H Hook
- Yarn Needle

**Gauge: Not Important**

### Band:

Ch 8

1. Hdc in 2nd ch from hook. Hdc 6. Turn. (7 sts)
2. Ch 1. Hdc in same st. In back loops only, Hdc in next 5 sts. Hdc in last st going through both loops. Turn. (7 sts)

Repeat row two until your band reaches:  
 -about 18"-19" for adult. You will get this measurement by **gently stretching your band** and measuring the length, not the pre-stretch length. You want the hat to be snug and due to differences in yarn stretchiness, I am not providing a row count. Instead, use your measuring tape. **Don't break yarn.**

Fold the long piece in half, and sl st the short ends together, forming a band. Turn the band so the seam is on the inside and the loop from the last sl st is at the top.

**Hat Body:** (stitch counts will vary depending on how many sc sts you work in row 1)

**Note: You do not need to tie off your yarn when you switch colors, simple drop it when you are done with the color and pick it back up for the next row you will be using it.**

1. Ch 1. Sc across one side of your band. Try to make them as even as possible, working one at in each row. Join with a sl st. (approx 72 - 80 sts, depending on gauge and how close you work your stitches).

2. Ch 2. Dc in same st. Dc in each st around. Join with a sl st.

3. *Join color 2.*

Ch 1. Sc in same st. Sc in each st around. Join with sl st.

4. *Using 1st color*

Ch 2. Dc in same st. Dc in each st around. Join with a sl st.

5. Ch 1. Hdc in same st. Hdc in each st. Join with a sl st.

6. *Using 2nd color*

Ch 1. Hdc in same st. Hdc in each st around. Join with sl st.

7. *Using 1st color.*

Ch 2. Dc in same st. Dc in each st around. Join with a sl st.

8. *Using 2nd color.*

Ch 1. Dc in same st. Dc in each st around. Join with sl st.

9. *Using 1st color.*

Ch 1. Hdc in same st. Hdc in each st around. Join with sl st.

10. *Using 2nd color.*

Ch 1. Hdc in same st. Hdc in each st

11. Ch 2.

Dc in same st. Dc in each st around. Join with sl st.

12. *Using 1st color.*

Ch 1. Sc in same st. Sc in each st around. Join with sl st.

13. *Using 2nd color*

Ch 2. Dc in same st. Dc in each st around. Join with sl st.

14. Ch 1. Sc in same st. Sc in each st around. Join with sl st.

15. Ch 2. Dc in same st. Dc2tog. \*dc, dc2tog\* repeat until the end. Join with sl st.

16 – 17. Ch 2. Dc2tog all around. Join with sl st.

Turn your hat inside out. Close your hat by threading a piece of yarn in and out through the last stitches at the top. Pull tight, closing the top. Tie a study knot and trim ends.



## CONFETTI TWEED HAT

### What you need: (affiliate links)

– Medium Weight Yarn ([Wool of Andes Tweed in Barn Door](#))

–H Hook

–Measuring Tape

*Special Stitch: 3-dc cluster. This stitch is a dc3tog, worked all in the same st. It has the bulk of 3 stitches, but has only one loop on top.*

Ch 2 does not count as first st.

### Gauge: Not Important

#### Ribbed Band:

Ch 8.

1.Hdc in 2nd ch from hook. Hdc in each remaining ch. Turn. (7 sts)

2.Ch 1. Hcd in same st. In BLO, hdc in next 5 sts. Hdc in last st, going through both loops. Repeat row two until your band reaches about 18" - 19" for adult.

You will get this measurement by **gently stretching your band** and measuring the length, not the pre-stretch length. You want the hat to be snug and due to differences in yarn stretchiness, I am not providing a row count. Instead, use your measuring tape. **Don't break yarn.**

To form the band, fold the band in half and using the loops where you left off, sl st up the side, sewing the two layers together. Turn the band so the seam is on the inside and the loop is at the top.

### Body:

1.Ch 1. Sc across the top, about 80 sts

2.Ch 2. 3-dc cluster in same st. \*Ch 1. Sk next st. 3-dc cluster in next st\* repeat all around the hat. Join with a sl st.

3.Ch 1. Sc in each st around. Join with a sl st. Repeat rows 2 and 3 respectively until your hat reaches approx. 8" tall (measuring from the bottom of the ribbed band. You will have approx. 18 rows.

**Last two rows:** Work a round of dc2tog. Join with a sl st. Tie off.

To close the hat, take a length of yarn and sew a loose running stitch around the top. Turn the hat inside-out. Pull both ends to cinch it shut. Finish with a **pom-pom**.





## PUPPY LOVE SLOUCHY

### What you need:

--5 Colors of Medium Weight Yarn [Knit Picks Brava](#) in Dove Heather, Marina, Cornflower, Mint, White  
 --I Hook  
 --Yarn Needle

**Gauge: 14 dc = 4"** ([Gauge Pattern](#))

### Special Stitch:

3-dc cluster: Yarn over, insert hook. Yarn over, pull through st (3 loops on hook). Yarn over, pull through first 2 loops (2 loops remaining on hook). Yarn over, insert in same st. Yarn over, pull through. Yarn over, pull through first 2 loops (3 loops remaining on hook). Yarn over, insert into same st. Yarn over, pull through. Yarn over and pull through first 2 loops. Yarn over, pull through all 4 remaining loops. *If it's easier to understand, it's a basically a dc3tog worked all in the same st.*

### Ribbed Band:

Ch 7.

**1.**Hdc in 2nd ch from hook. Hdc in each st. Turn. (6 sts)

**2.** Ch 2. Hdc in same st. Hdc 4 in back loops only. Hdc in last st, going through both loops. Turn. (6 sts).

Repeat this until your band is approx. 18 -19". You will get this measurement by **gently stretching your band** and measuring the length, not the pre-stretch length. You want the hat to be snug and due to differences in yarn stretchiness, I am not providing a row count.

Instead, use your measuring tape. **Don't break yarn.**

### Body:

Fold the band in half, and using the loop from the last hdc, pull it through and sl st down the side, forming a band. Don't tie off.

Turn the band, so the seam is on the inside and the loop is at the top.

**1.** Beginning where you left off sewing the band: Ch 1. Sc in same sp.

From here, you will sc around the band. Work approx. 3 sts for every 2 hdc rows on the band, achieving 72 total stitches. Join with a sl st with the first st, using 2nd color.

**2.**Ch 1. Dc 4 in same st. Ch 1. Sk 5 sts. \*Dc 4 in next st. Ch 1. Sk 5 sts\* work 11 times. Join with a sl st with the first st using Dove Heather. (60 sts)

**3.**Ch 2. Sc in middle of shell (not in a st, in the space between the stitches). Ch 2. Work a 3-dc cluster in the 3rd st of the 5 skipped sts from the previous round. \*Ch 2. Sc in middle sp of shell. Ch 2. Work a 3-dc cluster in 3rd sk st from previous round\* repeat all around the hat. Join with a sl st with first chain. (72 sts)

**4.**Ch 2. Dc in same st. Dc in each st around. Join with sl st. (72 sts)

Join 3rd color.

**5.-13.**Repeat rows 2 - 4 respectively, changing colors when you make the hearts row.

**14.**Ch 2. Dc in same st. \*Dc2tog, dc in next st\* work 23 times. Work a dc2tog with last 2 sts. (48 sts)

**15.**Ch 2. Dc in each st around. (48 sts)

**16.**Ch 2. Dc2tog all around. (24 sts) Tie off.

To close the hat, turn it inside out. Put a length of yarn on your needle and sew in and out each stitch across the top. Pull it tight, cinching the top closed. Tie a very sturdy knot and clip end.

Finish with a pom pom on top ([get the tutorial here](#)).



Turn the hat inside-out. Using your darning needle and a length of yarn, sew a loose running stitch around the top rounds. Cinch it tight, closing the top of the hat. Tie the two ends together in a strong knot. Clip ends. Finish with a pom-pom.

## AUTUMN FROST SLOUCHY

### What you need:

- I Hook
- Medium Weight Yarn ([Mighty Stitch in Silver and Pucker](#))
- Darning Needle

**Gauge: 14 sts = 4" ([Gauge Pattern](#))**

Ch 7.

- 1.Hdc in 2nd ch from st. Hdc 5. Turn. (6 sts)
2. Ch 1. Hdc in same st. Hdc 4 in BLO. Hdc in last st, going through both loops. Turn.(6 sts)

Repeat this until your band is approx. 18 -19". You will get this measurement by **gently stretching your band** and measuring the length, not the pre-stretch length. You want the hat to be snug and due to differences in yarn stretchiness, I am not providing a row count.

### **Don't break yarn.**

Take your ribbed strip and fold in half. Using the loop where you left off, sl st down the short side, making a band. Turn band right-side out, so the seam is on the inside, and the last loop from your sl st row is on the top.

- 1.Ch 1. Sc around the band, achieving 72 total stitches. Join with a sl st with the first st.
- 2.Ch 1. Dc, sc in same st. \*Sk 1 st. Dc, sc in next st.\* repeat all around the hat. Join with a sl st. (72 sts)
- 3.Ch 1. Sc, dc in same st. \*Sk 1 st. Sc, dc in next st.\* repeat all around the hat. Join with a sl st. (72 sts)
4. – 25. Alternate rows 2 and 3 respectively until your reach 25 total rows.  
Break yarn, tie off.





## SNOWFALL SLOUCHY

### What you need:

- **Mighty Stitch Yarn** in 2-3 colors (medium weight yarn)
- **G-J hook** ([work a gauge swatch to determine which hook to use](#))
- Darning Needle
- **Fur or Yarn pom-pom** ([make your own fur one](#)) ([Make your own yarn one](#))
- Tape measure

**Gauge:** 14 dc = 4" ([gauge pattern](#))

**Special Stitch:** Snowfall Stitch- Work this “half” sc by inserting hook, yarning over with second color, pulling it through. Drop second color, and finish the stitch with first color.

I have also included a video for the adult hat pattern. If you unfamiliar with how to work the “snowfall stitch”, the video demonstrates it.

### Teen/Adult

(Approx. 9" tall)

Ch 9.

1.Hdc in 2nd ch from hook. Hdc 7. Turn. (8 sts)

2.Ch 1. Hdc in same st. Hdc 6 in back loops only. Hdc in last st, through both loops.

Repeat row 2 until the row reaches 19" – 20" long.

Repeat this until your band is approx. 18 -19".

You will get this measurement by **gently stretching your band** and measuring the length, not the pre-stretch length. You want the hat to be snug and due to differences in yarn stretchiness, I am not providing a row count. Don't break yarn.

Fold the the ribbed piece in half and slip stitch into a band. Turn the band so the seam is on the inside and the loop is at the top. Continue on to make the body.

### Hat Body:

1.Ch 1. Sc 72 around the top of the band. Join with sl st. (72 sts)

Join 2nd color.

2.Ch 2. Dc in each st around. Join with a sl st. (72 sts)

3.Ch 1. \*Sc 3. work Snowfall Stitch in next st\* repeat all around the hat. Join with a sl st. (72 sts)

4.Ch 2. Dc in each st around. Join with a sl st. (72 sts)

5.Ch 1. Sc. \*Work Snowfall stitch in next st. Sc 3.\* work all around, leaving last st unworked. In last st, work a Snowfall Stitch. Join with a sl st. (72 sts)

6. – 17.Repeat rows 2 – 5, respectively, until you reach row 18.

18.Ch 2. (work with 1st color only) Dc in same st. \*Dc2tog. Dc\* work all around the hat. Join with sl st. (48 sts).

19.Ch 2. Dc2tog 24 times. Join with sl st. (24 sts)

Tie off.

### Finishing:

Tie off all the ends. Thread a length of yarn onto your darning needle. Turn your hat inside out and sew a running stitch, going in and out around the very top. Pull the ends and cinch shut. Tie the ends in a firm knot.

Turn right-side out and finish with a pom-pom!

# BUFFALO PLAID SLOUCHY

## What you need:

- I Hook
- Worsted Yarn (Knit Picks Mighty Stitch)
- Darning Needle

**Gauge: 14 dc = 4"** ([Gauge Pattern](#))

## Ribbed Band (use black)

Ch 7.

**1.** Hdc in 2nd ch from hook. Hdc 5. Turn. (6 sts)

**2.** Ch 1. Hdc in same st. Hdc 4 in BLO. Hdc in last st, going through both loops. Turn. (6 sts)

Repeat this until your band is approx. 18 -19". You will get this measurement by **gently stretching your band** and measuring the length, not the pre-stretch length. You want the hat to be snug and due to differences in yarn stretchiness, I am not providing a row count.

Note: You can make the hat band longer to make the hat larger ( or visa versa). When you begin the hat body, make sure your first round is worked in multiples of 6, minus 1.

Fold long piece in half and sl st the two ends, making a band. Turn so the seam is on the inside and your loop is at the top.

## Hat Body:

**1.** Continuing where you left off from the band, Ch 1 and sc in same space. Sc all around the top of the band, working 3 sc over the space of 2 rows. achieving a total of 71 sts. Join with a sl st.

Join Wine.

**2.** Ch 2. (Begin Plaid Stitch) Dc in same st. Dc in next st, finishing the final loop pull through with black. Drop wine and carry it through the next 3 stitches. Work 2 dc with black. Finished 3rd dc with wine. Continue this pattern all around the hat. Join with a sl st. (71 sts)



Join Red.

**3.** Ch 2. Dc in same st. Dc in next st, but finish the final pull through with Wine. Drop Red and carry it through the next 3 stitches. Work 2 dc with Wine. Finished 3rd dc with Red. Continue this alternating pattern all around the hat. Join with a sl st. (71 sts)



**4. – 15.** Repeat rows 2 and 3 respectively until you reach 14 total rows.

Tie off your yarn and weave in ends.

To close the hat, cut a length of yarn longer than the circumference of the hat and thread it through your darning needle. Turn your hat inside-out. Sew a running stitch all around the top of the hat.

Once you reach the beginning, pull the thread tight cinching the hat closed. Tie a firm and sturdy knot. Clip ends. Turn hat right-side out. Attach a pom-pom if desired.



### **Bonus: Make it into a Messy Bun Hat**

Work the slouchy hat up the row 9 on the body (8 rows of plaid stitch).

**10.** The plaid stitch will be worked with a dc2tog comprising the first 2 sts of the previous round, and working a single dc after. Work the round as follows, taking care to switch colors after each st:

Ch 1. Dc2tog. \* Dc2tog. Dc in next st (switch color)\* all around. Join with sl st. (47 sts)

**11.** The plaid st will be worked by making ONE dc2tog per set (to keep the color changes constant and lined up). You will change colors after each st.

Ch 2. Dc in same st. Dc2tog in each remaining st. Join with sl st. (23 sts).



## 8-BIT HEART SLOUCHY

### What you need:

- I Hook (5.5mm)
- Medium Weight Yarn ([Knit Picks Brava Worsted](#) in Red, Dove Heather, White and Black.)
- Darning Needle

**Gauge: 14 dc = 4" ([Gauge Pattern](#))**

### Ribbed Band:

Ch 7.

1.Hdc in 2nd ch from hook. Hdc 5. Turn. (6 sts)

2. Ch 1. Hdc in same st. Hdc 4 in BLO. Hdc in last st, going through both loops. Turn. (6 sts)

Repeat row two until your band reaches about 18" - 19" for adult.

You will get this measurement by **gently stretching your band** and measuring the length, not the pre-stretch length. You want the hat to be snug and due to differences in yarn stretchiness, I am not providing a row count. Instead, use your measuring tape. **Don't break yarn.**

### Body:

*Note: the patterns is worked using a tapestry crochet technique. To make sure your color changes are neat, you need to finished the last stitch with the next color. Since this is worked all in dc stitches, you will work a dc until you have the last 2 loops on your hook.*

*Drop your yarn, yarn over a loop on your hook using the next color you plan on using, pull it through both loops. The dc will look like a finished dc with a different color loop to start the next stitch.*

Be sure to carry your main color (gray) through the whole hat. You can drop the other colors. Keep the gray slightly tight, so it doesn't show through.

1.Ch 1. Sc 72 all around the top of the band.


Work about 3 sts over a 2 hdc row space.

2.Ch 2. Dc in same st. Dc 34. (finish the last dc with black). Dc 2 (finished second black dc with gray). Dc 35. Join with a sl st. (72 sts)

Now you have the starting point for your heart. To work the rest of the pattern, work a dc in each stitch around, using the graph as a pattern for your color changes.

**2 dc will equal one square on the graph.**

I found it was easiest to have two back bobbins, to go up the sides without carrying the yarn back and forth. For the red, I only used one bobbin. However, when I stretched it over from the left to the right for the next row, I worked it inside the stitch (the same way you would carry the yarn), so there weren't many strings loose in the back.



The last row of hearts will be row 13.  
(remember to count the first row of sc)

**14.**Ch 2. Dc in each st around. Join with sl st  
(72 sts)

**15.**Ch 2. Dc in same st. \*Dc2tog. Dc in next st.\*  
23 times. Dc2tog. Join with sl st. (48 sts)

**16.**Ch 2. Dc2tog all around. (24 sts)

**17.**Ch 2. Dc2tog all around. (12 sts)

Close the hat by threading a length of yarn on your darning needle. Turn your hat inside-out. Sewing a running stitching in and out through the remains stitches. Pull both ends and cinch the hole tight. Tie a firm and sturdy knot.

Finish with a pom-pom on top.



## DIAGONAL HATCH SLOUCHY

### What you need:

-Worsted Yarn ([Knit Picks Brava – Cornflower, Dove Heather](#))

-H Hook

-Sharp Yarn Needle(for weaving in ends nicely)

### Ribbed Band:

Ch 6.

**1.**Hdc in 2nd ch from hook. Hdc 4. (5 sts)Turn.

**2.**(BLO)Ch 1. Sc in same st. Sc 4. Turn (5 sts)

**3.**Ch 1.Hdc same st. Hdc 4. Turn (5 sts)

**4.**(BLO)Ch 1. Sc in same st. Sc 4. Turn. (5 sts)

Repeat row two until your band reaches about 18" - 19" for adult.

You will get this measurement by **gently stretching your band** and measuring the length, not the pre-stretch length. You want the hat to be snug and due to differences in yarn stretchiness, I am not providing a row count. Instead, use your measuring tape. **Don't break yarn.**

Fold the band in half and sl st the two short ends together to form a band. Make sure the ribbing is on the outside, and your seam is on the inside

### Hat:

**1.** Join yarn at the seam. Ch 1 and sc all around the hat. Work about 3 sc sts over two vertical rows for a total of about 76 sc sts. Join with a sl st.

**2.** Ch 1. Hdc in same st. \*Ch 1, sk 1 st, hdc in next st.\* repeat all around the hat. End with a ch 1, and join with a sl st at the beginning hdc. (76 sts)

**3.- 22.** Sl st one time, and ch 2. Work a hdc in the first ch sp. Ch 1, hdc in next sp. Repeat this all around the hat. End with a ch 1, and join with the beginning hdc. (76 sts)

Once you are finished, you will have a straight tube.

Now, using your second color you can work the hatches. The diagonal hatch is essentially a sl st working through the spaces between the hdc. They look diagonal because that is the shape that the spaces take naturally. Turn your hat upside-down, and work from the top (which is at the bottom) upwards. Start anywhere, pull up a loop in the middle ch of a space.



Insert your hook in the space below the ch you started at, and come up through the next space up.



Yarn over, and pull your loop through, completing a sl st.



To work the next one, insert your hook in the same place your yarn is coming up from. Come up through the next space up and complete the sl st.



Make sure you are working the slip stitches **VERY LOOSELY**. Give yourself plenty of slack, otherwise your hat will scrunch together. Work a sl st in each space, all the way up the hat until you reach the band. Finish with a sl st without going down into a space.



Tie a sturdy knot (weaving-in doesn't really work with the contrasting colors), and clip ends. Close the top by taking a piece of yarn, and sewing in and out through the top spaces. *Be sure to turn your hat inside-out before closing it.* I went in and out through every-other space. Pull it tight to close, and tie a very secure knot.

Finish with a pom-pom on top.





## SNOW BUNNY HAT

### What you need:

- I Hook
- 1 Ball of Knit Picks Brava in Cobblestone Heather (Medium Weight Yarn)
- Pom-Pom (you can [make a yarn](#) or [fur one](#))
- Darning Needle
- Tags(optional)

**Gauge: 14 dc = 4" (Gauge Pattern)**

### Ribbed Band:

Begin with a long tail. Ch 14.

1.Hdc in 2ndch from hook. Hdc 12. Turn. (13 sts)

2.Ch 1. Hdc in same st. In BLO, hdc in next 11 sts. Hdc in last st, going through both loops. Turn. (13 sts)

Repeat row 2 until your piece is 18" – 19" long.

You will get this measurement by **gently stretching your band** and measuring the length, not the pre-stretch length. You want the hat to be snug and due to differences in yarn stretchiness, I am not providing a row count.

Instead, use your measuring tape. **Place a stitch marker.**

Repeat row 2 for another 15 rows.

### Tapered End of Band: Work these rows in BLO

1.(This row makes a button hole) Ch 1. Hdc in same st. Hdc 3. Ch 5. Sk 5 sts, hdc into next st. Hdc 3. Turn.( 13 sts)

2.Ch 2. Sk same st. Hdc in next st. Hdc 9 (be sure to work in each chain). Sk next st. Hdc in last st. Turn. (11 sts)

3.Ch 2. Sk same st. Hdc in next st. Hdc 7. Sk next st. Hdc in last st. Turn. (9 sts)

4.Ch 2. Sk same st. Hdc in next st. Hdc 5. Sk next st. Hdc in last st. Turn. (7 sts)

5.Ch 2. Sk same st. Hdc in next st. Hdc 3. Sk next st. Hdc in last st. (5 sts)

Tie off.

Fold the band over until the flat end lines up with the row you marked with a stitch marker. Using your long tail from the beginning, sew in place with a length of yarn and your darning needle.

### Hat Body:

1. Flatten the band so the seam that connects the band is in the front. The flap will lay across the seam, like it's wrapped around, not fold backward itself. Join your yarn directly opposite of the seam on the back. Working from the outside, ch 1. Sc around the top of the band, working 72 sts. Work on either the top or the bottom of the band, depending on which way you want the button and flap to lay. Be sure not to work through both the band and the flap, just work around the main band of the hat.

Note: to keep your seam from shifting, you can begin every other row with 2 sl sts, and this will keep the seam more straight.

2.Ch 1. Sc, Dc in same st. Sk next st. \*Sc, Dc in next st. Sk next st\* repeat all around the hat. Join with the first sc. (72 sts)

3.Ch 2. Dc, sc in same st. Sk next st. \*Dc, sc in next st. Sk next st\* work all around the hat. Join with a sl st. (72 sts)

4. – 17.Repeat rows 2 and 3 respectively.

Note: you can work extra or fewer rows here to adjust the slouchiness of your hat.

18.Ch 1. \*Sc, dc in same st. Sk 2 sts.\* work all around the hat. Join with sl st. (48 sts)

19.Ch 2. Dc2tog 24 times. Join with a sl st. (24 sts)

Tie off. Weave in ends.

Using a length of yarn, sew a loose running stitch across the remaining hole at the top of the hat and cinch closed. Tie a firm knot and clip ends. Attach a pom-pom to the top. Sew a very large button on the hat brim under the button hold of the flap.
